### **Eastern Kingbird**

Find these birds perching on utility lines or hunting insects in an open area. Look for the white tip of the tail to help make a positive ID.



### **Hooded Merganser**

This species of waterfowl dives below the surface of water to find its food. Catch one in the act of hunting. What is it eating?



### **Solitary Sandpiper**

May is the best month to catch a view of this species as it makes its way north for breeding. Head to a wetland or river to find one probing the ground for food.



### **Baltimore Oriole**

Find an oriole singing high in the branches of a tree. Can you tell what age it might be? Males get their full color by their second year and females tend to develop deeper oranges with every molt.



### **Belted Kingfisher**

Belted Kingfishers spend almost all of their time by bodies of water. See if you can find one. Is it a male or female?



### **White-Throated Sparrow**

These birds can be found near the ground foraging for food. Look for the vibrant yellow between the bill and eye for a positive ID.



### **Yellow Warbler**

Look to the slender branches of shrubs and trees to see this species, or listen for a male calling from the tree tops.



### **Northern Rough-Winged Swallow**

This swallow may go unnoticed compared to the more colorful swallow species. Take the time to appreciate this brown and white bird using its remarkable agility to catch insects just above the surface of a river.
